WORD FROM THE PRESIDING MEMBER

Kia ora koutou, it's hard to believe we have passed the halfway mark of the school year and dare I say it feels a little like the summer break is coming – in a positive way! That said, we have some time to go and much to do. You will have had the opportunity to meet teachers and discuss your learner's progress in addition to receiving their mid-year report.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the teachers, support staff, school leaders and of course students and their families for the extra discretionary effort and continued progress we continue to see in academic achievement. It was particularly pleasing to see the school maintain high levels of overall achievement and in line with specific goals we have set in our strategic plan. Alongside 95% of all students making sufficient or accelerated progress at school, we have closed some of the achievement gaps that we have seen persist over recent years. We are ahead of the curve with regards to government's introduction of structured literacy and planning is underway for the new mathematics curriculum. We look forward to continued success in this area.

Carrying on with that theme of strategic goals, we continue to make progress in the cultural space with the engagement of a female kapa haka tutor and also an older student leader from the College to further support this kaupapa. We are a very culturally diverse school, and this diversity continues to grow with our school role growing rapidly in recent months. Though we are making progress in this area it is fair to say there is always more we can do because in many cases we simply don't know what we don't know. It is a journey of course and we encourage our community to share their culture to help us all understand and grow together.

PROPERTY UPDATE

Though we have not made the progress we all would have liked with our large strategic projects of a new classroom block and replacement school hall we continue to agitate fiercely in this space. With Government priority and funding changes recently announced the Board and school leadership have continued to engage with the Ministry of Education (MoE) on the matter of the school hall in particular. A multi-purpose focus group made of up school leadership as well as experts from within our school community has been established to help drive this. We have met with MoE earlier this month to continue to press our case and concerns given the growth we are seeing in the area. However, despite assurances from MoE the reality is that our place in the queue of projects will not likely be revised until 2025. With a focus on what we can do rather than what we can't, we are looking to progress to the concept design stage at least to keep things moving and be at the ready for when we are reassessed by the MoE.
